

Congratulations Scholarship Winners!

Surprisingly (despite the pandemic) we received even more applications than last year, setting a new record of 383! This impressive total included a record 23 international applicants. The international applicants hailed from eleven countries: Barbados, Brazil, Canada, Dominican Republic, Germany, India, Kazakhstan, Kenya, Mexico, Mongolia and Nigeria. There were many very fine essays, and it was particularly difficult to select only three from among our ten finalists.

Without further ado, allow me to present our Scholarship Winners::

Alexandra Ouimet - This year's winner of the Dr. Jerry Pournelle Scholarship, Alexandra is majoring in Marine Science at the University of Maine, entering her junior year in the fall. She took a couple of years off between high school and college to do volunteer work with Americorps NCCC and Utah Conservation Corps, among others. During one of her volunteer stints in Hawaii she became a certified scuba diver.

LeAnn Rhodes - LeAnn is the Dr. Yoji Kondo Scholarship winner. LeAnn will be attending Virginia Tech as a junior in the fall, majoring in Industrial and Systems Engineering. Having previously pursued a path in Political Science, she discovered that Engineering suited her better and changed her career path, though she plans to apply her knowledge and experience in the law to her new vocation.

Mandisa Keswa - Mandisa wins this year's Virginia Heinlein Scholarship - the "Ginny." Mandisa is entering her senior year at Pomona College, majoring in Neuroscience. Her family is originally from South Africa, and her life experience has helped her to develop a keen interest in health policy and providing better access to underserved communities. She has participated in genetic engineering and hippocampal research projects and plans to continue doing research after obtaining her degree.

For those of you contemplating attending the 80th Worldcon in Chicago (i.e. "Chicon 8"), 1-5 September 2022, we remind you that their Attending membership rates of \$170 (\$110 for "First Worldcon" attendees) will increase after 31 July 2021. The "First Worldcon" rate is for those physically attending a Worldcon for the very first time (attending CoNZealand in 2020 or DisCon III in 2021 virtually does not "count") and is quite a deal! With that, let me also thank the generous volunteers who contributed articles in my absence.

Some of these are going to look familiar. Three of the four writers I have covered before which means I liked their previous stuff.

Faith Hunter- "Junkyard Bargain: Shining Smith, Book 2" Audible Original

"Junkyard Bargain" is the second book in the "Shining Smith" series and is still most definitely science fiction and includes the unusual cats, self-repairing and self-replicating nanobots, warbots, motorcycle gangs, and enhanced humans. I again got soul sucked into this world, which is post-apocalyptic but not yet dystopian. The complexity of this universe keeps me interested and I again give this giant thumbs up!

Andy Weir- "Project Hail Mary" Signed Hardcover

This is the third novel by Andy Weir and is a fascinating look at multiple "first contacts". I enjoyed it as much if not more than The Martian. I got so involved in the "away teams" problems and problem-solving solutions that I did not want that part of the story to end. All in all, it was a satisfying read and one that I will probably read again just for the satisfaction.

Dean Koontz- "The Other Emily" Audible

Yep, another Dean Koontz novel. This one took me a while to get into as I could not decide if this was a horror novel or science fiction novel. Turns out it was a little of both. The "A" story is about love, betrayal, loss and redemption. The "B" story is the creepy story of a serial killer with the how and why he killed. How the two stories intertwine is what makes this a good book. I can give this book a thumbs up also!

Lois McMaster Bujold - "The Assassins of Thasalon" (Penric & Desdemona) Kindle

This is the tenth novella in this wonderful series set in Lois McMaster Bujold's World of the Five Gods. This is an on the road story with Des & Penric. It was fun and welcoming, and I just

never know what or where I am going to get or where I will be when I visit with Penric & Des. This story starts with an unusual assassination attempt on a character from one of Penric's earlier stories. It continues with a kidnapped child, demon assassins, a lazy Saint and a serious mission directly from the white God. There are the usual twists and turns and some happy endings. I cannot say enough good things about my visits to the World of the Five Gods. This too I hope will be forthcoming from Subterranean Press in a limited edition.

This fiscal year, we've made 269 shipments already, totaling 3,977 books distributed. Since the program's inception, we've sent 32,807 total books to our heroes.



The Heinlein For Heroes program (H4H) sends free books to troops, veterans, and military families. We send only to individuals or units that have requested SF material. Clearly many of our military men and women WANT to read good science fiction, including Heinlein. To meet that demand, our shipments go around the globe, as well as to veterans' hospitals here at home.

Contributions keep coming in, but your help is still needed. We need gently used paperbacks—and especially Heinleins, as we include Heinlein books in every shipment.

Money contributions are used to buy books wherever we find them (book dealers, eBay) at the right price. But free is even better than cheap. Is an SF friend or neighbor downsizing? You can help them and help us!

This is the largest donation received by H4H to date. We're so grateful for the gift and can't wait to Pay It Forward! (John Seltzer, H4H Chair, pictured above with both pallets)

This was signed with initials from two of the three 5th grade recipients identified by their teacher as precocious future scientists or engineers. Both were for the "Have Spacesuit Will Travel" (HSWT) books sent to San Antonio elementary school (one of the two Albuquerque Public School STEM magnet schools I contacted). The third

book went to a 5th grade teacher at the other STEM magnet school (Inez Elementary) who also identified a student; I got a thank you for that one from the teacher. I note that there were only about a month of in-person classes before the end of the school year, so these were for their summer reading. HSWT was, for me, a terrific inspiration—not only reinforcing my proclivity for "running the numbers" on problems (e.g., Cliff taking time out while being taken to Pluto to figure out how long it would

take to get there at one gee, and how fast they'd be going when they started to decelerate), but also getting me started—at age 10 or 11-- thinking and talking about going to MIT, which I ended up doing at age 17. I was a science nerd in those days —this is paying it forward to the other science nerds that will contribute to our future.
